

#### Benjamin S. Bleier | International Keynote Speaker

Dr Benjamin S. Bleier is an Associate Professor of Otolaryngology at Harvard Medical School, Director of Endoscopic Skull Base Surgery, and Co-Director of the Orbital Surgery Center. Dr. Bleier has authored over 100 articles, two textbooks, and holds 5 patents. Dr. Bleier has been recognized by the Michael J. Fox Foundation, Boston Magazine, and Harvard Magazine for his research.



## Dr Prepageran Narayanan | International Keynote Speaker

Dr Narayanan is Senior Professor and Consultant in the Department of Otorhinolaryngology, Head & Neck Surgery at University Malaya. His area of expertise includes Advanced Endoscopic Sinus Surgery, Endoscopic Skull Base Surgery, Otology, Neurotology, Skull Base Surgery and Cochlear Implants. Dr Narayanan is the author of more than 20 books including DVD and e-surgical manual videos, and has published more than 180 papers in local and international journals.



## Professor Peter Thorne | International Keynote Speaker

Professor Thorne is Director of the Eisdell Moore Centre, a University of Auckland centre for hearing and balance disorders and is Co-Director of Brain Research New Zealand, a national Centre of Research Excellence on the ageing brain. He has published widely on cochlear pathophysiology and sensorineural hearing loss. He contributes substantially to the hearing-impaired community and was made a Companion of the New Zealand Order of Merit in 2009.



### Dr Kellee Slater | Conference Dinner Speaker

Dr Slater is a surgeon at Brisbane's Princess Alexandra Hospital and Greenslopes Private Hospital. She trained in complex liver and pancreas surgery and liver transplantation both in Brisbane and the US. Dr Slater now specialises in surgery for all diseases of the liver, bile ducts and pancreas, including laparoscopic gallbladder surgery.


